



David Clay Whybark, MBA, Ph.D.

Academic Advisor to the IDB, Co-founder and Director of the Global Manufacturing Research Group, and Macon Patton Distinguished Professor of Business Administration (Emeritus) at the University of North Carolina's Kenan-Flagler Business School

Dr. Clay Whybark's industrial experience was with the Boeing Company and Douglas Aircraft. He holds a B.S. degree from the University of Washington in Aeronautical Engineering, an MBA from Cornell University, and a Ph.D. in business from Stanford University.

In addition to his teaching at North Carolina, he has held positions at Victoria and Canterbury Universities (New Zealand), IMD (Switzerland), Indiana University, SIME (Shanghai, China), Purdue University, Harvard, Arizona State, ESAN (Lima, Peru) and in Valparaiso, Chile. He has delivered seminars and executive programs at several universities and colleges around the world. Clay has authored or co-authored over 300 papers and business cases. Two of his cases won the European case of the year award for operations. He is also author or co-author of

several books including important works in computer augmented cases, master production scheduling, global manufacturing, and manufacturing planning and control systems.

Clay is co-founder of the Humanitarian/Disaster Relief Supply Chain Initiative, a group that studies and reports on developments in the field of emergency response and recovery. He has served as a consultant to several firms, universities, and governmental agencies in the US and abroad. Among others, he has assisted Pohang Steel (South Korea), the Indiana Steel Commission, Arthur Andersen, Carrier Corp., the University of Georgia, the Organization of American States, the National Park Service, Eli Lilly, Kobe Steel, and the New Zealand Ministry of Commerce. Clay has been an academic advisor to Woosong University (Daejeon, South Korea), the Institute of Technology (Bandung, Indonesia), and the Budapest University of Economic Sciences (now Corvinus University in Budapest, Hungary).

He has an honorary Doctorate from Corvinus University and has been presented the Distinguished Service Award of the Decision Sciences Institute, of which he is a Fellow and Past President. He is a Fellow of the Pan Pacific Business Association that also awarded him the Distinguished Global Leadership Award, is Past President of the Operations Management Association, and Past President and Fellow of the International Society for Inventory Research. He is on the program committee for the International Working Seminar on Production Economics, and has editorial roles for several other academic societies. Clay has been a Fulbright Scholar Sponsor and Soros' Fellow Advisor, and is listed in several bibliographical publications.
